Happy Fall Y'all! October is a busy time for Extension Offices as we are kicking off the new 4-H year and finishing up the past one with Achievement Banquets and events. The West Plains Office is no different and we love seeing the achievements of our 4-Hers and we are always willing to get new youth signed up to join the 4-H program. Why 4-H? Because, 4-Hers are 5 times more likely to graduate college, 3 times more likely to be physically active, 2 times more likely to actively contribute to their communities plus the benefits of public speaking, running a meeting, plus more. So if you have a youth between the ages of 7-18 and would like to enroll them in 4-H, please reach out to us for more information.



Have a child looking to attend college or trade school next fall? Now is the time to fill out the FAFSA Form (Free Application for Student Aid) that will help with your financial aid for the 2024-2025 school year.

To find the form, visit the Federal Student Aid website: <a href="https://studentaid.gov/fafsa-app/ROLES">https://studentaid.gov/fafsa-app/ROLES</a>. This site will help you walk through the process. I want to stress that you want to 'Create an Account' first. This will then become your Federal Student Aid (FSA) ID. Since you will be using this login information year after year, it is very important to keep login credentials and paperwork in a safe place. Students and parents will need to keep their FSA IDs separate as it serves as your legal signature.

Once you set up your login credentials, you will begin to fill in details regarding current financial status and education plans. The first time you do this, it will be a longer process, but in the future, it should pre-populate the fields for you. Refer to the chart to see what documents you will need to complete the form. Please note that if you are a 'dependent' student, you will need your parent/quardian's information as well.

When completing the form, be sure to list any school that you are interested in even if you are not sure if you will be attending that school or not. To do this, you will need the Federal School Code for each school that can also be found on the aforementioned website.

Still need assistance? There is an easy to follow video available at https://studentaid.gov/apply-for-aid/fafsa/filling-out.

For more information, contact your school's counselor or contact the Financial Aid office at the school that you plan to attend.

## INFO NEEDED FOR FAFSA

- · Name, Date of Birth, Address
- Social Security Number
- Parents' Social Security Numbers (if you are a dependent student)
- · Driver's License Number
- Federal Tax Information: Tax Documents or Tax Returns, including W-2 information, for you (and your spouse, if you are married), and for your parents (if you are a dependent student):
  - IRS Form 1040
  - Foreign Tax Returns (if any)
- Records of your untaxed income, such as child support received, interest income, and veterans non-education benefits, for you, and for your parents if you are a dependent student
- Information on cash; savings and checking account balances; investments, including stocks and bonds and real estate (but not including the home in which you live); and business and farm assets for you and for your parents if you are a dependent student.

## **FALL FOOD FACTS**





Pears have more fiber than almost any fruit. They are high in Vitamin C, sodium free, fat free, and cholesterol free. Pears naturally contain phytonutrients and other antioxidants. Unlike many other fruits, they ripen from the inside out, so eat them before they get soft on the outside or they'll overripe.

A medium kiwi supplies more than the daily recommendation for Vitamin C, along with folate, several antioxidants and phytochemicals that may help protect your body's cells from damage. Cut an unpeeled kiwi in half and scoop out the fruit with a spoon.





Studies have shown that people who eat broccoli, along with other cruciferous vegetables like cabbage, kale, Brussels sprouts, radishes, and cauliflower, have lower risk of cancers of the lung, breast, pancreatic, bladder. and colon. Serve the veggies raw with kids' favorite salad dressings or dips.

Blueberries, with their fiber, folic acid, vitamins A and C, and beneficial antioxidants, may help reduce risk of cancer and heart disease. Freeze them on a cookie sheet, then package them in containers or bags so kids can grab a handful and pop them in their mouth for a crunchy treat.





ARE YOU A VICTIM OF BLTS?

Prunes are some of the most versatile fruits and a source of fiber, vitamin A, and potassium. And they are sodium and fat free. Add them to cold and hot cereal and fruit salads, stuff them with peanut butter and an almond, include halved or pitted prunes in turkey or chicken salad for a fun and tasty pita sandwich filling.

The bites, licks and tastes area are all hidden foods we put in our mouths throughout the day when we are really not that hungry. Some examples are:

- Standing at the refrigerator and grabbing a piece of cheese
- Going to the pantry and eating a handful of cookies or crackers
- Eating chips out of the bag while watching TV or sitting at the computer
- Sampling food at the grocery store
- Eating leftovers instead of saving them for another meal
- Sampling while cooking and baking
- Stopping at the candy bowl at the office

All of these behaviors are sabotage for losing weight, and you may be a victim without really realizing it. By engaging in BLTs, weight gain can sneak up on you!

#### The Bottom Line:

Snacking on the wrong kinds of foods, especially when you are not hungry, is not a good idea. Here are better behaviors for weight control:

- Eat a good breakfast every day including a whole grain bread or cereal product, milk and fruit.
- Snack on plenty of fruits and vegetables or nuts instead of chips and crackers.
- · Eat a diet high in fiber and lower in refined foods so you feel fuller on fewer calories.

## OCTOBER GARDEN CALENDAR





Plant garlic cloves for next summer's harvest. Fall planting gets a jump on spring conditions.

Pick pumpkins and winter squash. Keep in a warm area for a couple of weeks, and then store in a cool, dry location.

- Till the garden at the end of the season and add organic matter such as manure or compost to improve soil structure.
- Make notes of successes and failures in the garden for next year.
- Pick and discard fallen fruit to reduce disease for next year.



Plant spring flowering bulbs, tulips, daffodils, and others.

- Remove dead annuals from the garden.
- Trim perennial stalks to tidy the garden for winter.
- Pot bulbs for indoor forcing.
- Clean up dead iris and peony foliage and destroy it to decrease the spread of disease.
- After a light frost, dig canna, glads, dahlias and other tender bulbs for winter storage.
- Make notes about the garden to document successes and failures.



Continue to mow the lawn if necessary, bluegrass 2 inches, tall fescue 2.5 inches

- Core aerate turf to reduce soil compaction, improve drainage, break up thatch and help nutrients move within the soil.
- Control dandelions, henbit, and chickweed with a broadleaf herbicide while seedlings are
- Sharpen mower blade for a clean cut.
- Keep fallen leaves removed from the lawn to prevent sharing and dieback of grass.



- Plant trees and shrubs and keep them watered during dry winter months.
- Once the leaves have fallen, transplant trees and shrubs.
- Trim dead, broken, or diseased branches from trees and shrubs.
- Enjoy fall leaf color, which normally hits its peak about the third week of October.


