Sound Living: Understanding hospice care

K-State extension specialist explains how hospice care can help the dying and their families By Lisa Moser, K-State Research and Extension news service

MANHATTAN, Kan. - Just as newborns require a lot of care, so too do the elderly as they face their approaching

death. For many, that care comes through a nurturing provider known as hospice.

"Hospice is a form of care that focuses on comfort, not healing," said Erin Martinez, K-State Research and Extension specialist on adult development and aging. "With hospice, we are helping people live out the end of their life with dignity to make the entire dying process be the best it can be."

Martinez said that a hospice team is comprised of many people, including doctors, nurses, aides, social workers

and religious aids (for those who would like that counsel).

"This team of folks specialize in death and dying to make it a great experience for both the patient and the family," Martinez said. "These folks keep the patient comfortable and educate the family on the dying process." To qualify for hospice care, the patient must be diagnosed with a terminal illness that will allow them to live less than six months if the disease were to run its normal course, Martinez said.

She added that hospice care can be done in the person's home, or in a facility that feels like a home environment. "Hospice is a family-based decision, but it is up to the individual about how they want to experience the end of their life," Martinez said. To help families learn more about hospice care and the services available, K-State extension specialists have created a fact sheet titled, Understanding Hospice, available online from the K-State Research and Extension bookstore.

Martinez said: "When we reach the end of our life, death can be complicated for some and smooth for others. The

goal of hospice is to make this an easier process for all."



SUM QUICK TIPS FOR MOSQUITOS



Applying an insect repellent when outdoors may help with controlling mosquito and tick bites. Repellents with DEET provide better coverage. Insect repellents with higher amounts of DEET in them do not necessarily provide better coverage, just longer. All products containing DEET provide exactly the same quality of protection against mosquitoes and ticks. The only real difference between a product with 15 percent DEET and one with 45 percent DEET is the length of time that it provides the protection.

The easy-to-find products with about 20 percent DEET give adults four hours of protection. That should be plenty for almost everyone. It's not recommended to use products with more than 33 percent DEET. Children are more sensitive than adults are to repellents, so parents must read and follow label directions exactly. Mosquito repellant that doesn't contain DEET is not as effective. Please make sure that you use a DEET based product if you will be in an area that is heavy with mosquitoes. Also, wash the repellant off once you go indoors.

When applying sunscreen and a DEETbased repellent at the same time. sunscreen's effectiveness can be reduced by as much as 33 percent. More frequent sunscreen applications may be necessary to prevent painful sunburns. If applying both at the same time, always apply your sunscreen first then then repellent. It is not recommended to use a product that combines insect repellent containing DEET and sunscreen. Repellents usually do not need to be reapplied as often as sunscreen.. Always follow the instructions on the label of whatever product you are using.

Here are some key things to know:


The goal is for the first survey to go out the week of June 9. Two reminders will be sent to all participants who have not completed the survey. The survey will close mid-July.
