

The Science of Freezing Food

September is Food Sufety Education Month. Always practice the core four Fight BAC practices for food safety: Clean, Separate Cook and Chill, but also practice safe food preservation methods. Here is some information on the "Science of Freezing Food".

Freezing food is an easy way to preserve high quality food with maximum nutritional value. But food in the freezer doesn't last forever as changes will occur during storage.

Freeze food as soon as possible after harvest to stop chemical compounds, called enzymes, that cause deterioration and spoilage. Enzymes are naturally in foods and must be inactivated to stop loss of color and nutrients, as well as flavor changes. Blanching vegetables is an important step to inactivate enzymes. In fruit, color changes are prevented by using pure ascorbic acid (vitamin C) or a commercial ascorbic acid mixture such as Fruit Fresh®.

Because of high water content in fruits and vegetables, texture changes occur. Water expands when frozen which ruptures food cell walls. Freezing food quickly will help reduce texture damage. Don't overload the freezer with unfrozen food and keep the freezer as cold as possible, at least 0°F or below.

Over time, food loses moisture during freezing which leads to freezer burn. Use packaging designed for freezing to reduce this


Freezing does not kill bacteria, it only slows it down. When food thaws, any bacteria present will become active again, Always inspect food and packages carefully before use. Want to increase your bloom production on your peonies? K-State's horticulture expert Cynthia Domenghini says, while it is not necessary for long-term growth, dividing your peonies this fall could help increase bloom production, reduce disease, and provide more plants for your garden.

To start dividing peonies, Domenghini said gardeners should cut the stems just above the soil surface. Next, dig up the entire root system and remove soil from the roots.

"Divide the root clump into small sections using a sharp knife," Domenghini said. "Ensure each section has 3-5 buds as well as healthy roots."


The planting location should receive sunlight at least half the day. Dig a hole large enough to fit the roots of the divided peonies so the buds will be covered by 1-2 inches of soil.

"Plants buried too deep may not flower," Domenghini said. After planting, water thoroughly.

Space dwarf peonies at least two feet apart and standard peonies four feet apart. To protect the newly divided peonies in cold weather, add a layer of straw, leaves or compost after the soil freezes.

Domenghini warns that it may take a couple years for divided plants to return to full bloom productivity.

The 4-H Member Record Book is an organized summary of your entire 4-H experience that contains a comprehensive report of your goals, plans and accomplishments.

Why Build A Record Book and Make A Report?

It is one way to make a formal review of your goals and achievements and is a helpful tool to plan your own growth for the future. Your achievement records and report will be a good keepsake for years after you've finished your 4-H career. The record you build opens doors to many awards and benefits such as medals, trips, scholarships and other kinds of recognitions. Completing a record book will make it easier to apply for scholarships and state level awards that reward 4-H members with scholarships and trips.




4-H Members Develop the Following Life Skills Through Record Keeping: · Maintaining records of 4-H project and club work, school and community activities Keeping personal and business records

Improving communication with other people

· Learning time management and organizational skills

· Learning responsibility and developing goal setting skills



There are many positive reasons for integrating and record-keeping into 4-H projects throughout the year. Keeping a 4-H record book aims to help youth:

Learn how to organize themselves

· Learn how to set reasonable goals for themselves

· Appreciate what they learned each year from the goals they reached

Recognize what they learned in their 4-H projects

· Explain what they've learned

Keep track of costs of their projects

Gather information needed to apply for awards and scholarships

Complete applications and resumes for jobs and college

· And yes, also meet requirements to participate in some county, state, or national 4-H events.


Criteria for Judging Record Books

Neatness, completeness and clarity of your records are very important. Your 4-H story is also an equal important item in your report. The judges will be looking for experiences in 4-H projects and activities as shown by knowledge acquired, attitudes and skills learned, scope and size of project growth and development. Leadership, citizenship and community service are equally important. Indicate your involvement in these areas by your development of positive attitudes toward service to others, your leadership experiences as both officers and committee members and in one on one leadership opportunities.

Here are some friendly suggestions to help 4-H members to get started on year-end records:

- Decide on project goals now, before you get started in the project, rather than at the end of the project when you already know what you did. If you write goals at the end of a project then they really aren't goals.
- Copy it: Make a copy of the record sheet and post it somewhere in your house so that you can write down activities as you complete them. Refrigerators and family bulletin boards are great places to post your "in progress" record sheet. When you're ready to complete your final version, type all of your hand-written notes into the project record and permanent record.
- · Photos: Create a file folder for photographs, with sub-folders for each project. This a great way to organize pictures of your activities and to keep them in a central location. You would be amazed at how easy it is to find pictures for your photo pages if they are all together.
- · Keep a Calendar: Write down all the activities you do for your club, your county, church, school, and for your projects. If you keep one calendar you can go back to the end of the year and see how much you have done. It also helps you make it to meetings on time and at the right place.

Records shouldn't be a frightening part of a 4-H experience. You do all the work, you should get credit for it. Take the time to use these hints or develop your plan in order to take the nightmare out of record keeping.
